For convenience, i have scaled two detail images supplied by James and Ike as if the carpets they come from are the same size.



### Please note the **two versions of the gul**.

The color in the lower of the two images seems to be off the charts. Some will suspect that such is due to photographic technique, and that **may** be the case. However, i can verify that there are related pieces that, in life, do indeed jolt with electric/neon/shocking color quality. An important contributor to that is the extraordinary lustre of the wool in such pieces.

The above comparo illustrates why i stated earlier that i was not sure that James's piece is well considered 'electric.' James, what do you think? Does your image fairly represent the intensity of color in your piece? I would particularly point out the difference in the blues between the two images and ask if your photos well represent the depth of the blues in your piece?

How about one more? This piece is on the market, so i present it without comment.

#### Regarding James Blanchard's marvelous rug in post #1

### James,

In response to your request for related examples of directly similar rugs, and in addition to the helpful examples from Joel and others, here are a few more references: Benardout (2002 -Bygone Era) #37 (very similar); Christie's East auction (Homer Collection) (9/11/90) #78 (quite similar); RR piece sold in 2012 or before -see photo immediately below; Sorgato (2007) #33. (Very sorry I do not have ready access to color photos of more of these for posting.)



Some of the same design elements in your/James' absolutely marvelous piece appear in the tired, corroded rug below. Facts: 173 cm x 109 cm (5' 8" x 3'7"); Asy left, very little depression, fine wool, H27 x V35 per dcm = 945 kpdcm2 (roughly 61 kpsi); back does not look or feel like those of Sistan balishts, it is floopy-flimsy (perhaps because so many knots are corroded); warps- ivory and dark wool yarns plied together in some cases, wefts- two shots undyed (?) light brown wool; selvage two cords GH wrapped. Drawing highlights: weaver must have been an independent sort, letting the main field gull break through both the gyjak and the minor border before stopping at the main border. She also varied the gull appearing in the two horizontal main field bands (reminiscent of the similar but more complete, fully symmetrical motif in James' piece) by either adding/omitting a horizontal design element.



Now for something a little more provocative (!), another piece which might or might not have "Mushwani" attributes is the squarish darak (?)/bagface below. Much darker and less colorful in hand than in this (unaltered) photo. Similar example in Sorgato (2007) #97. Facts: 100cm x 96 cm (39" x 38"); Asy, left, slight depression, H35 V48 =1680 kpdcm2/ roughly 108 kpsi. Fine wool. Warps- ivory wool, wefts- 2 shots brown; selvages 4 cords, two outer cords

Drawing highlight: two large horizontal main field bands (top and bottom) here contain a very similar motif as the two bands in the following examples: James post #1 rug, Benardout, Christie's, RR example and the rug above in this posting. (I wish there were a name for this motif which I am at a loss to describe.)

I first encountered this type of thing at the Philadelphia ICOC (1996). When I say 'this type of thing,' I am not referring to the 'Mushwani' design,but rather to the vibrant (in some cases, 'electric') palette.

As you see, i am using 'electric' as a descriptor. Do any of the images you posted suggest an 'electric' palette? That is entirely subjective. However, when compared to some of the other images in this thread... Decide for yourself.

FWIW, i used to (tounge-in-cheek) call them 'neon' rather than 'electric.' Perhaps i should have stuck with that, but i didn't want to invite misinterpretation- either as to whether i think the source of color is synthetic (i most certainly do not), or whether i am being dismissive (i am not). FWIW, for me personally, most 'electric' pieces do not inspire me the way some other M-Group pieces do. But, that is perhaps a topic for another time.




